

Quantum Feng Shui



Feng Shui

In the analysis of Feng Shui, the home is seen as an organism, the second skin of the person living in it: the Mind-Body system expanded in a circumscribed space. One studies the relationships that are created between the environmental factors present in the space outside and inside the house and the psychological, physical, and emotional manifestations.

This is possible because Feng Shui applies the knowledge of Chinese Medicine to space that for 5,000 years has connected Psyche (the subtle side composed of the quality of thoughts and emotions) to Soma (physiology of the body) to Environment (the territory in which one lives and moves) and behavior.

The home sends stimuli (colors, sounds, light, images, temperature, shapes, smells, materials, order, natural and man-made elements, noise pollution, electromagnetic pollution, etc.), and the body responds with an activating neurochemical reaction of the PNEI System (see note).

Feelings of safety, confidence, enthusiasm, lightness and freedom should be perceived from the home.

Emotions, discomforts, and disharmonies manifest themselves in the space where one lives with precise choices of style and space management: color contrasts, finishes and materials that are discordant with each other or too pronounced, excesses or shortcomings in objects, pursuit of perfection, mania for cleanliness, accumulations, clutter, large bulky furniture, broken doors, often closed windows, poorly flowing home paths, rooms that are cared for differently, rooms with different temperatures, little personalisation of rooms, etc..

The home represents aspects of life (work, couple relationship, money, health, friendships, creativity, self-esteem, visibility, etc.), family members (father, mother, children, ancestors) and body parts (all human biological systems).

Therefore, taking care of the space also means working on one-self, so that unconsciously one works on the part of the space that reflects one's Mind-Body-Emotions system.



The house where one lives shows one's present, a snapshot of the various areas of one's life.

By optimizing and changing details of the areas of the house, one goes on to improve areas of one's life.

Note: Psychoneuroendocrinoimmunology (PNEI) consists of a new model of personal care that deals with the mutual interaction between the behavior, mental activity, nervous system, endocrine system, and immune response of human beings.



The 5 elements

If the concepts of Yin and Yang express an energetic duality like the two poles of a magnet, the 5 elements represent 5 different phases of Qi or Chi (life energy).

This theory is the basis of many Chinese practices such as medicine, martial arts or Feng Shui itself. To explain it, reference is made to five symbolic elements of nature, specifically, fire, earth, metal, water and wood. Each of them represents a movement, a different transformation of Chi.

It should be mentioned that the original translation of the Chinese word Wu Xing is not 5 elements, but rather refers to five different moments or phases of energy, which advises us not to fall only into the physical association of the elements. Some authors, such as sinologist J.M Kermadec, refuse to use the wrong term. It should be understood that it is natural that there may be certain gaps produced by the original adaptation of Chinese philosophy to Western thought without counting the passage of time. By consensus and general usage we normally speak of the 5 elements.

The element fire is related to the energy of ascension, brightness, and summer, earth to circular movement and thus changing cycles, metal to inward movement and the autumn season, water to descending energy representing winter, and wood to outward movement and energy appearing in spring. These are just a few associations based on movement and the natural seasons.

An extremely rich range of associations interferes in the 5 elements, such as fire is related to summer and also to the heart, the red color, certain emotions such as stress or impatience, as well as triangular shapes, etc.

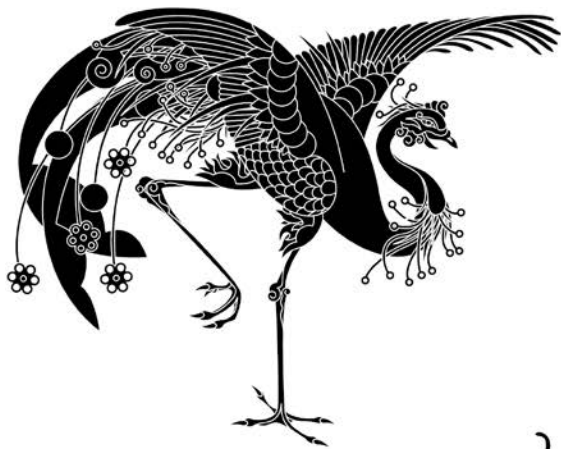
Each element is part of an extended description that allows us to categorize spaces by weighing the kinds of energies that influence them. These relationships make it possible to make a more or less accurate reading of events that develop or might occur in a space.

Chinese theory suggests the need for the five elements to be in mutual balance. Fire, for example, serves to give heat, to cook, to transform raw materials, but in excess it can be a great destroyer. Or like water, which serves as a source of transportation and storage, but when out of balance can lead to flooding or extreme drought.



The 5 Animals

In Feng Shui, it constantly refers to a set of animals (or essences) that reflect certain favorable characteristics for a natural space. The animals referred to are called the black turtle, red phoenix, green dragon, white tiger, and finally the yellow dragon (the latter is also described as the "yellow snake"). Each of them represents a particular characteristic and their essence "lives" or "is called to live" in a certain space.



THE YELLOW DRAGON

Element: earth, center of the house (area 5).

This celestial entity is undoubtedly one of the most iconic symbols of Chinese art, appearing in almost every depiction of its mythology. It is one of the five celestial animals and represents dynamic forces. In Feng Shui, the yellow dragon occupies a significant place due to its association with the element of earth and the energetic power it encompasses. It represents stability, balance, and grounding.

The dragon is often used as a symbol to focus and create harmony in an environment. The color yellow is associated with the energy of the earth. It is related to the center and the earth, so it has a place of preference among the animals in Feng Shui. The dragon is interpreted as the virtual center of the other four celestial animals, guarding, watching, and distributing the movement of energy around it.

As the dragon symbolizes wisdom and perception in many cultures, it is a very receptive and sensitive animal, paying attention to everything around it. Therefore, a yellow dragon in Feng Shui practices can be seen as a reminder to stay aware, balanced, and centered, fostering a positive and harmonious environment by ensuring optimal energy flow.

The yellow dragon symbolizes ourselves, residing in the core of our home, with each perspective shaped by our own point of view. We flow in a centered, balanced, and harmonious way from our inner self (emotions, mind, spirit) to the outer self (our immediate environment) in a calm and transcendental way, deeply centered and grounded.

THE BLACK TURTLE

Element: water, blue circle.

The black turtle, as a celestial animal, embodies a fundamental aspect of Feng Shui: protection, solidity, and stability. With its shell and apparent immobility, it perfectly symbolizes these essential qualities. They represent the most significant symbol of longevity, stability, balance, good fortune, support, and protection. The energetic signs of the tortoise, as a celestial entity, create a sense of security and support, just like the protective shell of the turtle.

Feng Shui is an ancient tradition that teaches how to intervene in the environment to achieve greater harmony reflected in our lives; this art teaches that the turtle can positively influence the surrounding energy and attract good luck. The black turtle symbolizes support, endurance, good health, stable wealth, and longevity of good fortune. The black turtle, as a guardian animal, reflects a fundamental aspect of good Feng Shui, which is protection, solidity, and stability. Through its shell and apparent stillness, this celestial animal correctly designates these needs. The turtle is among the most revered and sacred Feng Shui symbols, representing wisdom, endurance, and long life.

The turtle is also used as a symbol of protection and longevity as they are one of the animals that live the longest. If they feel threatened, they are kept inside their shells, thus protected. Turtles have a deep meaning in Feng Shui, representing positive qualities and protective energies. They bring harmony and good luck. They are harmonizing energy and improving people's quality of life. The black turtle invokes Chi or divine breath, generating all positive attributes, thus providing support, resistance, good health, wealth, happiness, and longevity.

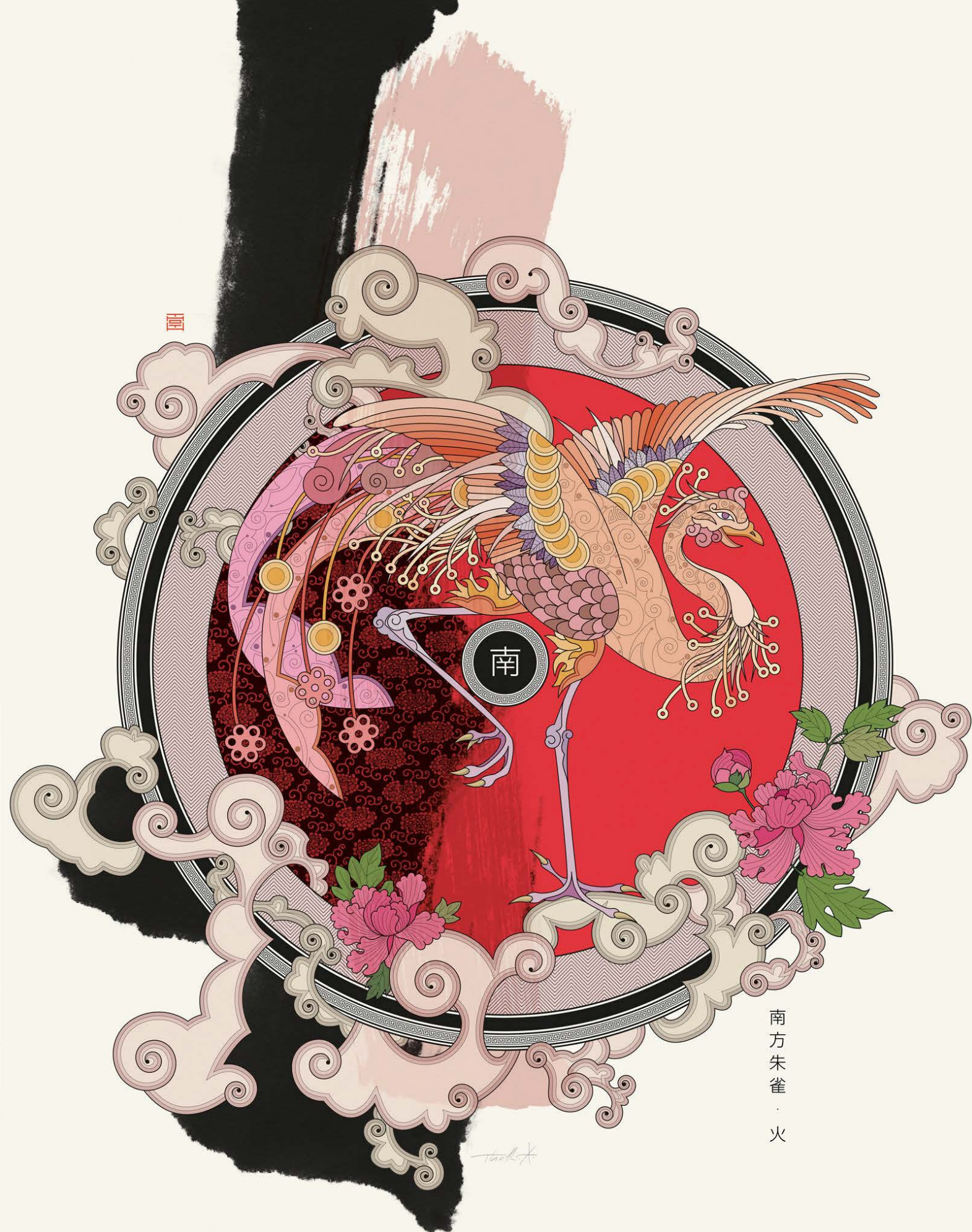
THE RED PHOENIX

Element: fire, red circle.

The mythological red phoenix represents the power sent from the heavens; it symbolizes the highest loyalty and honesty. The red phoenix signifies fire, the Sun, justice, obedience, and fidelity. This celestial bird has very positive connotations, and it is a symbol of great virtue and grace. Among other energies, it is recognized for benevolence, charity, and humanity; honesty and righteousness; loyalty, reciprocity, altruism, fidelity, and integrity; and knowledge and wisdom. It symbolizes the union of Yin and Yang and the ability to give the best of oneself.

The majestic red phoenix upholds its principles with a broad vision, allowing it to be vigilant of the heights. He skillfully controls the flow of Qi (Chi), understanding the importance of balance. He does not fully expose himself to all influences, as that would jeopardize his safety. To harness the energy of the red phoenix, one must appreciate the vast and expansive nature that embodies the essence of the red phoenix energy. This way, the red phoenix will bring numerous good opportunities into your life.

The red phoenix is a transmuting creator of all the energetic flow of the place giving origin to earth (yellow dragon) that generates metal (white tiger) that creates water (black turtle) and that nurtures wood (green dragon); it will allow you to transform within yourself all those limiting beliefs that do not allow you to develop your full potential as long as the phoenix can come and go in total freedom in the infinite horizon of your home. The red phoenix protects you, bringing you health and energy with its divine fire.

THE GREEN DRAGON

Element: wood, green circle.

The green dragon, as a celestial guardian in Feng Shui, is linked with its counterpart, the white tiger. It represents abundance and prosperity in life. The green dragon is associated with intuition and wisdom, often attributed to the feminine essence. The flow of life energy emanating from this celestial animal is gentle and protective, bringing you wisdom, abundance, and prosperity.

The green dragon is one of the most powerful and supreme symbols of spiritual dominion, a sign of protection and prosperity. It is associated with plants, trees, and other vegetation. It represents earthly and heavenly power, knowledge, and strength, therefore benevolent. They provide health and good luck. It represents a powerful and benevolent energy that can bring good fortune, success, and protection. The dragon is often considered to be the guardian of wealth and prosperity.

The green dragon is conducive to an abundant flow of energy, light energy (Yang energy), and is a carrier of magic, power, wisdom, and good luck. It is a vigilant protector of the sacred, providing in the environment where it is invoked a protected space, sacred and full of blessings.

As a deity that promotes harmony and wisdom, the dragon is one of the most powerful symbols of Yang. It watches over, protects, and represents the divine — giving security to the environment and people, favoring and allowing them to be nourished by natural and cosmic forces to always attract good fortune.

THE WHITE TIGER

Element: metal, gray circle.

The white tiger embodies strength, energy, and courage. This celestial animal offers care, companionship, and thoughtful contemplation in making rational decisions. The white tiger represents the strength of the Earth, the emanation of energy coming from the center of the Earth; this representation favors the settlement of Qi (Chi). The white tiger, recognized as Yin energy, possesses a magnetic, soft, and stable energy. It offers protection, tranquility, and relaxation. The white tiger in the mystical realm is a spiritual guardian that symbolizes lightning or air, and its roar is capable of causing overwhelming thunderstorms. They are mythological creatures, and the probability of one being born naturally is one in ten thousand. Their fur is sacred because it represents purity and strength. It also represents world peace or transparency and well-being.

The white tiger embodies purpose and patience (just as a tiger deliberately and patiently stalks its prey). Its power is coiled and hidden deep within, but a tiger can spring into action with transformative, even deadly force at will. The white tiger is thought-provoking, representing strength, boldness, and impetus. The white tiger is considered one of the most sagacious celestial animals with great magical powers, fast as lightning, expressing heroism, but above all, energetic and cosmological, as they represent sovereignty over oneself and the cosmic balance that must always be maintained. The energetic essence of the white tiger propitiates personal introspection that will lead you to increase your level of consciousness, receiving greater well-being in all areas of your life. The white tiger in Feng Shui will protect your home and ensure wealth, in addition to attracting health to your family.

Quantum Feng Shui

Quantum Feng Shui was born in 2023 from an idea of Ramon Sist: to use Quantum Therapy and its system to improve the quality and raise the quantity of energy in the various areas of a living space.

Based on "classical" Feng Shui, Quantum Feng Shui (QFS), through a series of programmed cards, calls up certain energies to balance the various elements (water, earth, metal, wood, Fire) in each of the 9 areas including the essences of various "animals."

Each card in the QFS is programmed and activated to balance both a specific living area and the person himself. In the person and the home will be transmuted all blockages and programming that limit the full "effectiveness" of any given area/aspect of life.



Figure: QFS cards.

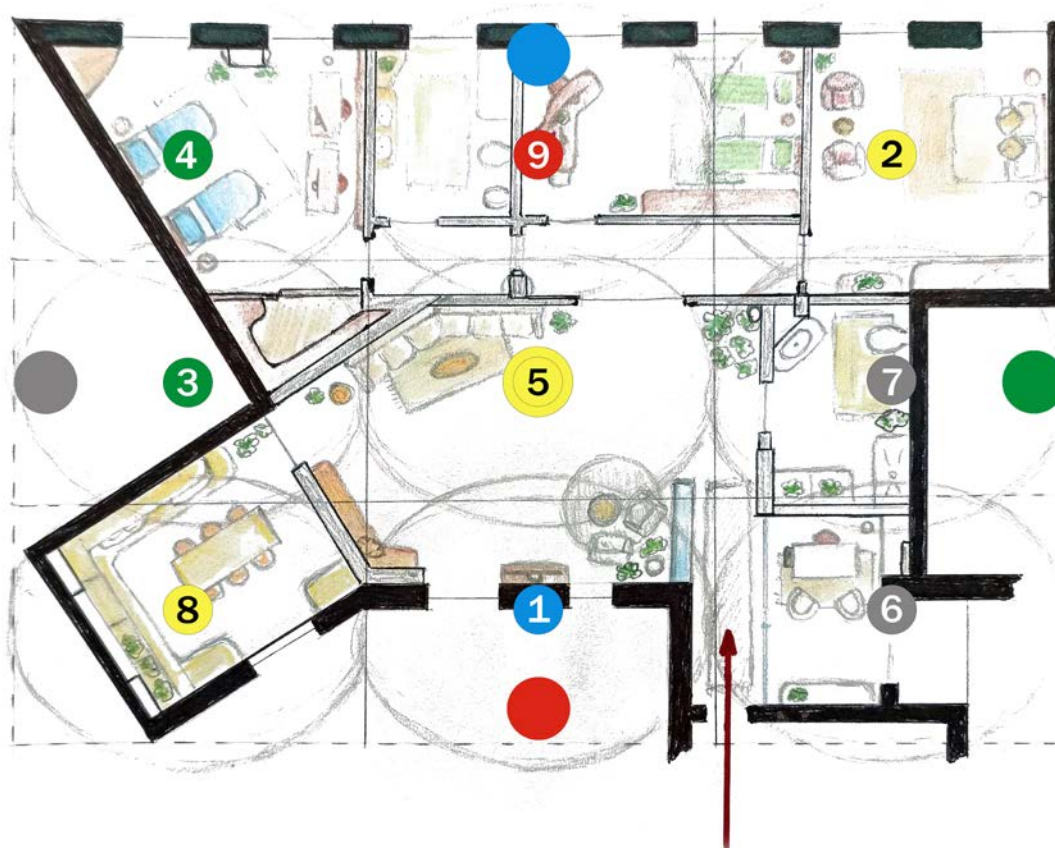


Figure: a map of the 9 different areas in a house.

Example: card number 1 "work and career", once placed in the correct area of the living space, has the function of transmuting all the limiting programming in the area itself (contained physically in the objects, furnishings and environment) and, at the same time has an effect on the person(s) in the area of their life (work and career) by transmuting their "personal" limitations and their conscious and unconscious projections. They are called limiting programming because on a practical level, they limit the balance. In this case, it hinders in the environment the balance of the water element and the "work and career" archetype, while simultaneously maintaining (and often increasing) limitations on various levels "within" the subtle bodies (energy systems) of the people themselves.

What are Quantum Fengshui cards and how do they work?

QFS cards are space balancers; they are programmed and activated, which means that "subtle" code made up of specific commands is added.

They are based on the principle that the Universe in which you live is not the only one that exists. There are thousands and thousands of other Universes, and connected to each of them are thousands and thousands of Parallel Universes (alternate dimensions where something happened or did not happen or happened differently).

Programming creates bridges between the universe in which you live and the Parallel Universe where cards have a certain function: for example, the ability to balance a specific area of the house.

Each card must be placed in the area for which it was programmed. Level 3 of the "Quantum Leap" project (and subsequent masters) teaches how to approach and work with the Parallel Universes.





The 9 areas and the Bagua

The Bagua is a diagram that indicates many things including the 9 areas of a living space, it is a "grid" that you place over the map of the place, thus getting the location of the 9 different areas.

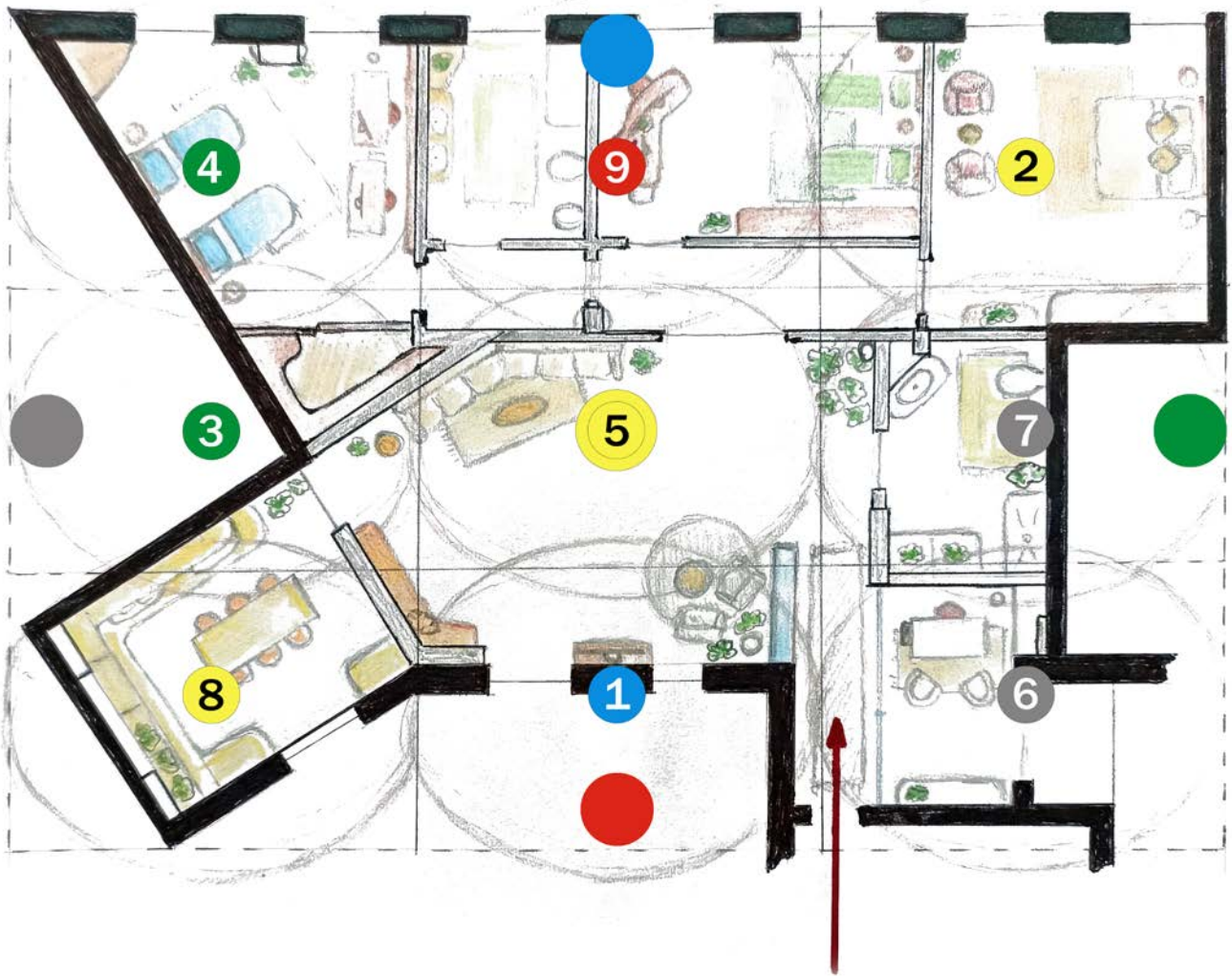
The bottom part, represents the side where the main entrance of the space is (in Bagua it is called "north," specifying that it is not the north of the classical known cardinal points, for Bagua and therefore for Feng Shui, it is the side **where the main entrance is**).

With this arrangement, the 9 areas in space are thus obtained. The animals, except for the yellow dragon that "lives" in the center, live in the 4 directions/layers: The phoenix (red symbol) in the front (main entrance), the black turtle (blue symbol) in the back, the white tiger (gray symbol) and the green dragon (green symbol) on the left and right respectively looking at the main entrance from outside the building/place.



The bagua shows the 9 areas in a building/space, see the example map in the next illustration to understand where the areas are. The main entrance is marked with a dark red arrow (side where North of the Bagua is collocated). In the Quantum Feng Shui, the areas are always geometrically regular.

The 9 areas and the 5 animals



1. Work and career
2. Relationships
3. Ancestors and family of origin
4. Wealth and money
5. Current family and health
6. Friends and support
7. Projects and creativity
8. Self-awareness
9. Fame and visibility

Red circle: the red phoenix

Blue circle: the black turtle

Green circle: the green dragon

Gray circle: the white tiger

Yellow circle (area number 5): the yellow dragon

After placing the 9 area cards and the 5 animal cards, I still have blocks in one area of my life. What can I do?

In this case, you can use the 5 element cards to improve/strengthen the balance of a particular area, you can also use "strengthening" elements that "generate the main element."

- **Water generates wood**
- **Wood generates fire**
- **Fire generates earth**
- **Earth generates metal**
- **Metal generates water**

Example: if area number 2 is unbalanced even after having placed QFS card "2", you can improve the balance of the area by adding an "earth" card and/or a "fire" card.

Why are there 27 cards in Quantum Feng Shui?

Quantum Feng Shui consists of 9 cards for the 9 areas, 5 cards of the animals to be placed at certain points, and 13 cards of the 5 elements to balance some of the 9 areas when you need "more balancing power".

Where to put the animals cards?

The animal cards (except the yellow dragon card that lives in area 5) must be placed on the 4 perimeter walls inside the space, whereas the number cards can be placed anywhere within the delimited area.

What concrete effects, Quantum Feng Shui have?

Improving one's areas of life: work/career, emotional relationships, ancestors and family of origin, wealth and money, current family and health, friends and support, projects and creativity, self-awareness, fame and visibility, greater fluidity and greater connection with oneself.
